

OVERVIEW OF THE IMPACT EVALUATION PROCESS

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Mandate of the National Population Commission(NPopC)

- NPopC was established by the Federal Government in 1988/1989 and constitutionally mandated to
- Undertake periodic enumeration of population through sample surveys.
- Publish and provide information on population for development planning; and
- Establish a National Geographic Frame for Sample Surveys, etc.



Collaboration between NPopC and MLE in the NURHI Project

- Technical exchange to ensure high quality data for NURHI evaluation
- Strengthen NPopC's capacity to undertake longitudinal data collection
- Support evidence to action initiatives in Nigeria to improve family planning and maternal and child health for urban and peri-urban poor and vulnerable populations.



Specific Role of the NPopC in the Evaluation Process

- Provided the EA sampling frame
- Undertook household listing and sampling of eligible women and households
- Conducted the baseline survey
- Conducted midterm survey, and
- Undertook the endline survey



Role of the NPopC in the Evaluation Process (cont.)

- Handled data editing and entry of all the above surveys
- Participated in the **baseline and midterm** report writing workshops
- Participated in a workshop on data analysis and paper writing

DRMC	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Conducted tracking and facility surveys
Federal Ministry of Health	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Provision of FP talks and samples (for training)



Conclusion:

- An evidence of a healthy and sustained collaboration – NPopC, FMoH, and MLE that led to the generation of valuable but rigorous longitudinal survey data
- These data are robust and cover several areas of RH especially FP and should be used to plan FP programs and policy especially in urban Nigeria
- The NPopC is strengthened to undertake longitudinal studies at the population level in the future
- The in-country private sector (DRMC) is also enhanced in longitudinal tracking of respondents
- Enhanced private/public collaboration by NPopC and DRMC for data collection
